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Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit.

Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practice cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God.

Gospeller About eight days after Peter had acknowledged Jesus as the Christ of God, Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah"--not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from

the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

On the next day, when they had come down from the mountain, a great crowd met him. Just then a man from the crowd shouted, "Teacher, I beg you to look at my son; he is my only child. Suddenly a spirit seizes him, and all at once he shrieks. It convulses him until he foams at the mouth; it mauls him and will scarcely leave him. I begged your disciples to cast it out, but they could not." Jesus answered, "You faithless and perverse generation, how much longer must I be with you and bear with you? Bring your son here." While he was coming, the demon dashed him to the ground in convulsions. But Jesus rebuked the unclean spirit, healed the boy, and gave him back to his father. And all were astounded at the greatness of God.



Liturgy Notes – Ashes

The practice of beginning Lent exactly forty fast days before the Easter Triduum – that is on a Wednesday – only began in the seventh century, but it was another three centuries before that Wednesday became "Ash" Wednesday. The custom of marking penitents with ashes originally began in France and Spain, but it had nothing to do with Lent: it was a rite reserved for those who had publicly confessed their sins and now undertook public penances imposed by their bishop. Men and clerics' heads were sprinkled with ashes, women's foreheads were marked with the cross; all wore distinctive garments and were seated in designated places in church, from whence they were dismissed after the sermon. Public sinners were suspected of never having been really converted, and so in some ways they were treated like those who were preparing for Baptism: just as Lent was already a time of intensive preparation for initiation into the Church, so it also became a time of penance and amendment for those seeking readmission at Easter. In time, the primary connection of Lent to Baptism was lost, and this season became exclusively associated with penance. Marking both men and women's foreheads with an ashen cross on the Wednesday beginning Lent – now Ash Wednesday – was extended to the whole church in 1091, and Lent came to be regarded as a season of personal and corporate repentance.

Of course, using ashes as a symbol of penance was ancient even in the time of Jesus. Jeremiah and Isaiah, Daniel and Jonah are all associated with the practice: Much to Jonah's chagrin, we are told that the king of Nineveh found Jonah's preaching so powerful that immediately he rose from his throne, laid aside his royal robes, put on sackcloth and sat in ashes. In the books of Judith and First Maccabees, we're told specifically that the people placed ashes on their heads. Jesus, too, refers to the use of sackcloth and ashes as signs of repentance: "Woe to you, Chorazin! Woe to you, Bethsaida! For if the mighty deeds done in your midst had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would long ago have repented in sackcloth and ashes" (Lk 10:13). Needless to say, there is nothing magical about ashes: they do not accomplish anything of themselves. However, they can be a powerful, public statement of personal culpability and a determination to change. Some people imagine that appearing in public with ashes on their foreheads is somehow a statement that they are 'holier than thou'; it doesn't take a whole lot of reflection to realize that the truth is quite different: to wear ashes is to signify one is a sinner in need of repentance. For over a thousand years, this custom has maintained a strong hold on the popular imagination: millions of people receive ashes on Ash Wednesday, many of them not practicing Christians, some of them not Christians at all, but each of them powerfully attracted to the opportunity to publicly yet wordlessly assert the unvarnished truth, "I am a sinner". On Ash Wednesday, we state that before God in the silence of our hearts, we own that in the midst of our parish community, and we even dare to declare it to the world. And in that truth, we take the first steps towards forgiveness and healing.
