READING 1 A reading from the Prophet Isaiah

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old-- and Sarah herself was barren-- because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.



Liturgy Notes: Liturgical Books

There are three different books used in the celebration of the Eucharist, which often appear fairly similar but which have quite different functions. The Book of the Gospels, through which Jesus speaks to the assembled church, is the volume which is placed on the altar at the beginning of the celebration, and later carried in solemn procession for the proclamation of the Gospel. Because it contains the words of Christ, it is sometimes kissed, incensed and treated with particular reverence. The complementary volume used in the Liturgy of the Word is the Lectionary, from the Latin word 'lectio' for a reading or lesson. A Lectionary contains readings from the Old and New Testaments, psalms and canticles, but no Gospel texts. Whereas the Book of the Gospels is normally used by the deacon or priest, the Lectionary is used by the lay readers.

Just as the chalice and paten hold the Body and Blood Christ for Holy Communion, the Book of the Gospels and the Lectionary contain the Word of God, which feeds and nourishes God's holy people; like those sacred vessels, these books are often decorated – beautifully printed and well bound, with metal or embossed leather covers – treated with reverence and handled respectfully.

There are some extraordinary examples of early Books of the Gospels: the Book of Kells and the Lindisfarne Gospels instantly spring to mind. These surviving manuscripts are usually associated with monasteries and cathedrals, stable environments where solemn liturgies were normal – parishes could seldom afford such lavish productions.

Meanwhile missionaries and bishops traveling around their dioceses could not carry collections of altar books. Instead, two types of books emerged. Sacramentaries contained no scriptural texts or chants, only those words spoken by the celebrant. For the convenience of bishops they also included texts for other Sacraments and rites besides the Eucharist. We sometimes use texts from the most famous of these ancient manuscripts – the Leonine, Gelasian and Gregorian Sacramentaries.

By far the most common book, however, was the Missal, comprising selections from the lessons, Gospel readings, and the collects and common texts of the Mass, assembled and bound into one volume. Although prior to the current Prayer Book there was an Anglican Missal in use, there is no longer an approved Missal as such. The nearest we have is the Altar Book, which may be used throughout the liturgy.

Essentially the Altar Book is a convenient collection of those texts from the Book of Common Prayer which are relevant to the Eucharist: the collects, prefaces and Eucharist Prayers in normal use. There are no Gospels or lectionary readings. In most circumstances, the celebrant could simply use a Prayer Book instead of an Altar Book. However, in more solemn celebrations, the Altar Book becomes necessary because it contains the musical settings for many of these texts.


