To Philemon our dear friend and co-worker, to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow soldier, and to the church in your house:

When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother.

For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love-- and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back forever, no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother-- especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.



Liturgy Notes: Actions and Gestures

It may seem that the liturgy is performed by a relatively small group of people, but Christian worship relies on the full, conscious, active participation of the entire congregation. Clearly, we all participate verbally: by proclaiming the Creed, joining in the prayers, making the responses, and particularly in the Great Amen at the conclusion of the Eucharistic Prayer; but we also participate physically, by standing, sitting, kneeling and processing. Even more subtle, however, are gestures and actions, like bowing, signing with the cross, kissing sacred objects, raising our hands and eyes to God, blessing people or objects, that both emphasize what is being said as well as conveying responses and emotions that are deeper than any words can express.

The liturgy is rich with opportunities for ritual gestures and actions for the celebrant, all of which are guided by the primary symbols of Christ's presence at the celebration of the Eucharist: the altar and the Book of the Gospels, and then later by the presence of the consecrated Sacrament itself. Many of the actions the celebrant performs take the shape of the Cross, which characterizes so much of Christian worship's art and architecture, decoration and symbolism. The Cross, or Crucifix, always holds a special place of honor in the Christian assembly. The altar is treated with special reverence – bowed to, kissed, incensed – because it is the place where Christ steps into time and space to make himself present among us, for us, and with us, over and over again. The Book of the Gospels is honored in the same ways because it represents the voice of Christ speaking to the assembly, the very Word of God in our midst. Finally, after the Eucharistic Prayer and the people's Great Amen, these symbols give way to the real presence of Christ himself in the Sacrament of his Body and Blood.

Therefore we, before him bending, this great Sacrament revere; types and shadows have their ending, for the newer rite is here; faith, our outward sense befriending, makes our inward vision clear. (St Thomas Aquinas)

Determining which actions and gestures are appropriate to the members of a congregation should probably be shaped and guided by consideration of these same primary symbols – the Cross, the altar, the Book of the Gospels – and the Holy Eucharist itself. At the same time, every group of believers, even every worshipper, has to decide what expressions of faith and reverence are culturally appropriate and meaningful to them. In Zaire, for example, the congregation rhythmically sways while praying, and the priest dances around the altar: entirely suitable for Central Africa, but unlikely to catch on at Good Shepherd!

Without natural and yet telling actions and gestures, worship can remain on an abstract, intellectual plane, always a temptation in the Western Church. Over the next few weeks, we will explore some of the expressions of reverence and devotion that many Episcopalians have adopted, both from our Anglican heritage as well as the broader Christian tradition.


